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Foreword from the Board of Trustee & Executive Director

Collaboration that Builds Resilience

The National Disaster Management Agency (BNPB) has recorded an increase in disaster events of 16.17%, from 4,650 incidents in 2020 to 5,402 incidents in 2021 (BNPB, 2022). This is the highest disaster occurrence in the last decade. Building citizen resilience against disasters is both crucial and relevant in Indonesia as Indonesia is the most disaster-prone country in the world. YAPPIKA-ActionAid defines resilience as the ability of citizens to recognize, challenge, and change unfair and unequal power relations that dictate their vulnerabilities; to adapt positively to changing circumstances, and to mitigate, prepare for, and recover swiftly from shocks and stresses in such a way that their wellbeing and human rights are protected. In working, YAPPIKA-ActionAid uses a work definition of resilience which carries three elements of capacity: absorption, adaptation, and transformation.

The theme 'Collaboration that Builds Resilience' is central to YAPPIKA-ActionAid's work in 2021. Strengthening the capacity of citizens, communities and Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) to have equal access to the economy, public services, politics and power relations is the resilience-building strategy set out by YAPPIKA-ActionAid. In carrying out this strategy, YAPPIKA-ActionAid also builds collaborations at both implementation and funding levels. Collaborating with various sectors of civil society, communities, local to national governments, as well as academics at the implementation level. In funding, YAPPIKA-ActionAid is supported by thousands of individuals, hobby communities, CSR, philanthropic organizations and donor organizations.

Based on a resilience framework, throughout 2021, YAPPIKA-ActionAid Humanitarian and Resilience (HAR) Priority Program carried out an earthquake response action in Mamuju Regency, West Sulawesi and provided long-term support for disaster-affected communities to build their resilience. Similar work was also underway in Pandeglang and Serang Banten Regencies, as a continuation of the response to the earthquake and tsunami in 2019, and in Donggala and Sigi Regencies, Central Sulawesi, as a continuation of the response to the earthquake and tsunami in 2018. In addition, YAPPIKA-ActionAid also built community resilience through organizing an inclusive COVID-19 vaccination event. This vaccination measure was specifically provided to vulnerable and marginalized groups who had not been reached by vaccination because the approach used had not been culturally sensitive or appropriate to these groups. YAPPIKA-ActionAid collaborated with 18 organizations/alliances/communities, including the disabled community and the PRB Forum in 18 regencies in 5 (five) provinces. In particular, YAPPIKA-ActionAid started working with young women through youth-led social research activities in Tamanjaya Village, Pandeglang Regency. Through this research, young women and girls attempted to identify the problems in their communities, and advocate solutions to the problems they and their peers face in the village they live in.

The Gender Responsive and Inclusive Public Service (GRIPS) Priority Program has integrated disaster preparedness and local food security into the Safe Schools Program. An integrated program is one of YAPPIKA-



ActionAid's strategies to build community resilience. The Safe Schools Program has been running for more than six years. This program has developed from focusing only on one safety pillar of a school, which is safe from collapsing, to further safety pillars such as safety from disasters, safety from bacteria/viruses, safety from malnutrition, and safety from violence against children. These are all parts of an effort to guarantee children's right to proper education.

In 2021, YAPPIKA-ActionAid provided capacity building support for more than 30 CSOs across various provinces. This work was conducted under the CSO Capacity Strengthening (CSOCS) Priority Program, in collaboration with The David and Lucile Packard Foundation and USAID/MADANI through FHI 360. Such capacity building support and mentoring was carried out over a period of one year or more, both in internal and external capacity areas, such as organizational governance, organizational management, communication, advocacy, and community organizing. In general, CSO capacity strengthening can be seen from the ability to produce organizational development plans, provide evidence for advocacy, and increase the legitimacy of CSOs in the eyes of the government, which all will contribute to building CSO resilience.

According to Prof. Dr. Azyumardi Azra CBE M.A. in his article entitled Regression of Democracy and Recentralization, the regression of Indonesian democracy has become a growing topic of discussion, and one that is becoming more intense as it goes. Many parties, including Indonesian and

foreign researchers and observers alike, have proposed its symptoms and indicators. The Indonesian Political Indicator Survey (October 2020) revealed that around 69.6% of citizens are increasingly afraid of expressing their opinions openly. Through the Civil Society Arena Advocacy Priority Program (Civic Space Advocacy/CSA) and with the CSO network, YAPPIKA-ActionAid continues to strive for a more conducive supporting environment for CSOs to carry out their roles. Advocacy on civil society arenas, roles and resources is carried out at the national, regional, and global levels. This type of advocacy aims to reduce the marginalization of CSOs which results in a reduction in meaningful participation in development and governance, which will in turn impact on civil society resilience.

The various efforts to encourage external change above are supported by fundraising and the strengthening YAPPIKA-ActionAid governance. Fundraising comes from public donations, corporate social responsibility funds, and grants from donor agencies. YAPPIKA-ActionAid collaborates with community campaigners, youth communities and hobby communities to fundraise in the community. The transparency and accountability of YAPPIKA-ActionAid fund management in 2021 is evident from the opinion of the Financial Audit Report 'unqualified in all material aspects', released by the Public Accounting Firm Paul Hadiwinata, Hidajat, Arsono, Retno, Palilingan & Rekan.

YAPPIKA-ActionAid works with civil organizations in program areas, in line with YAPPIKA-ActionAid's mandate, to provide support to civil organizations in Indonesia.

Throughout 2021, YAPPIKA-ActionAid partnered and collaborated with the Komite Pemantau Legislatif (KOPEL) Indonesia, PATTIRO Banten, Bengkel APPEK, Yayasan Bahtera, Gemawan Institute, Perkumpulan SOLUD, and Yayasan Prakarsa Swadaya Masyarakat (YPSM) to encourage gender-inclusive and gender-responsive public service.

Furthermore, YAPPIKA-ActionAid also collaborated with several parties in its Humanitarian Action and Resilience program, namely:

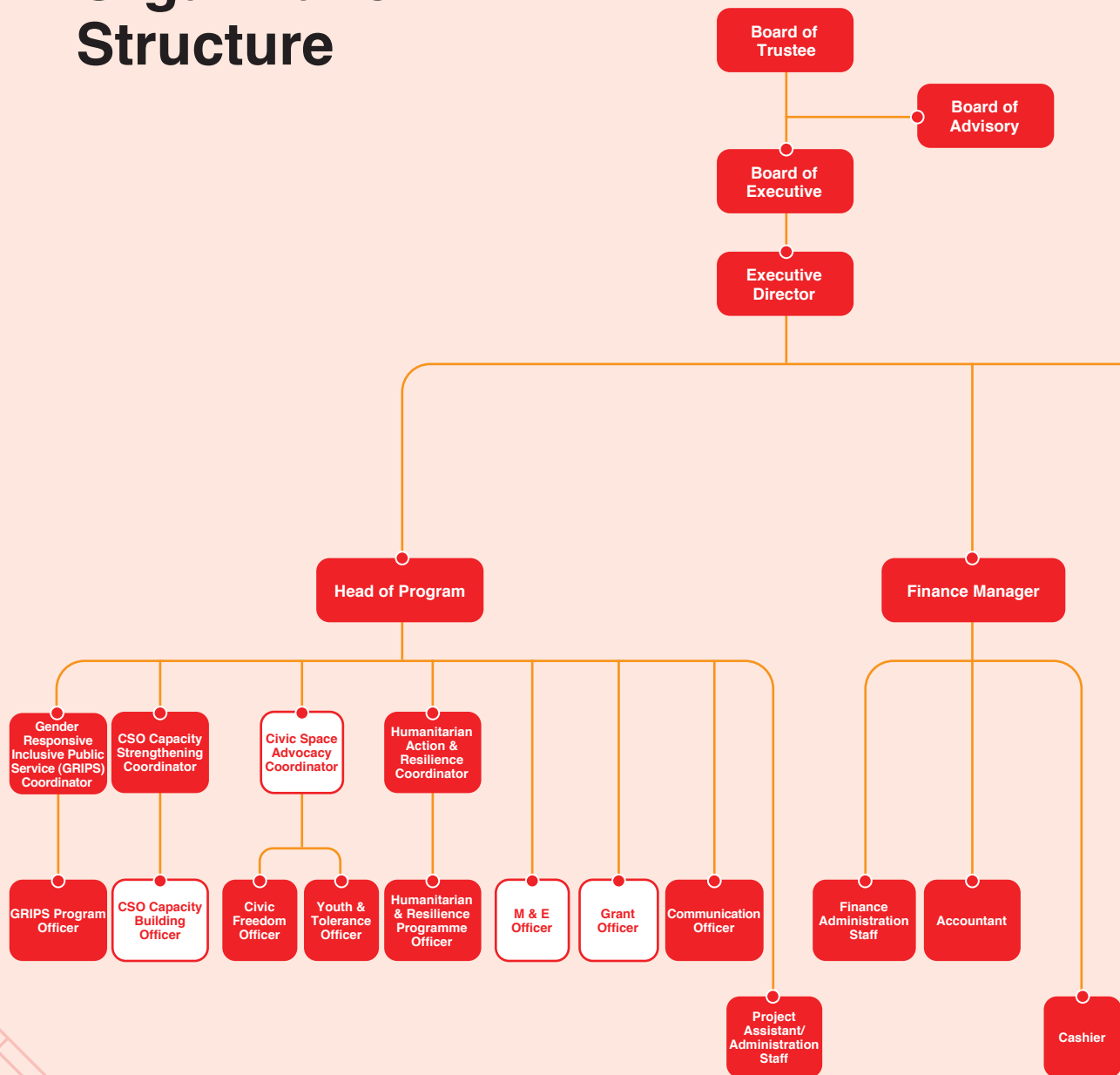

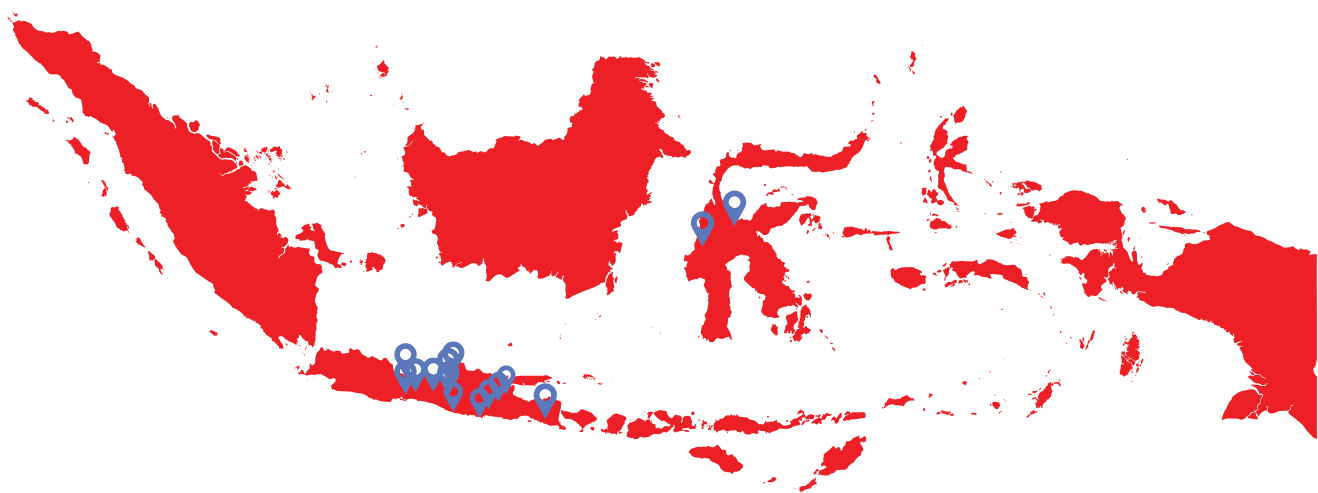

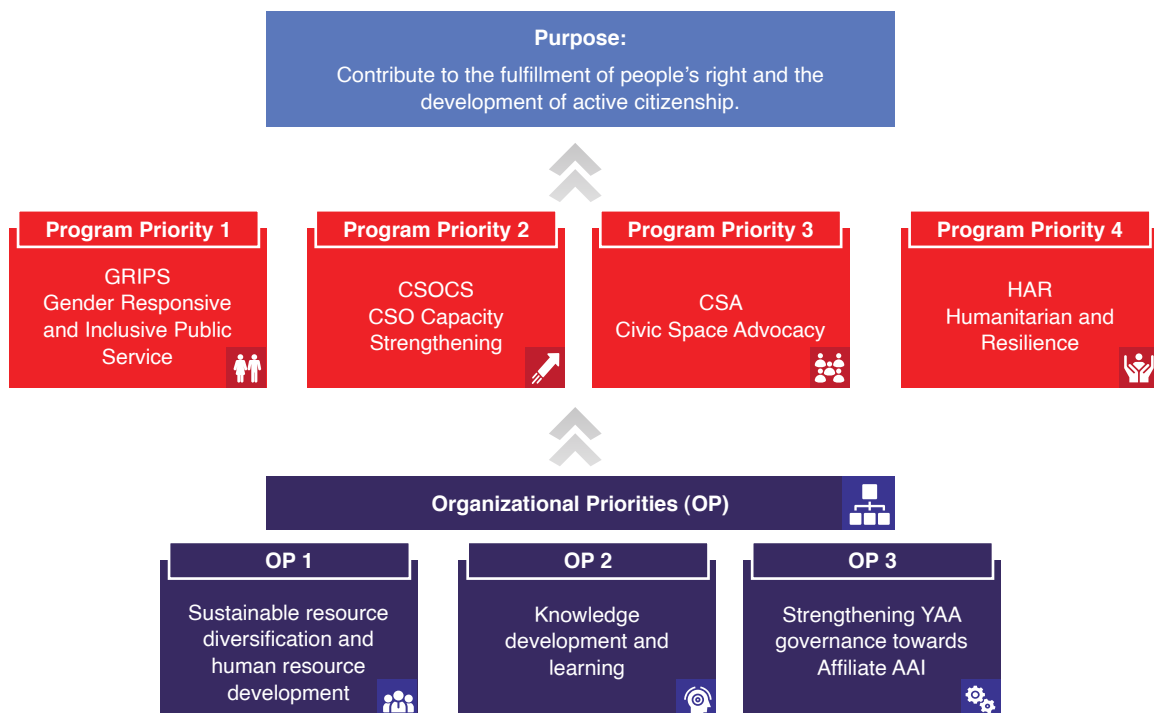

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**Program
Priority 1**

Gender Responsive and Inclusive Public Service

The Program Priority 1 of YAPPIKA-ActionAid fights for the fulfillment of basic rights to public services for vulnerable and marginalized groups by encouraging a human rights-based approach and advocating for gender-responsive quality public services.

Expected Target Achievement

In 2028, we expect several targets to be achieved, among which are:

- 1** A minimum of 100 schools can adopt Safe Schools programs as a pilot model for inclusive and disaster-safe schools;
- 2** Strengthening the early detection system involving the community and government in 20 regencies/cities that are the targets of Healthy Village advocacy, where elementary schools are also one of the intervention centers to address child nutrition problems;
- 3** Improvement of quality essential services, including health, education, and population administration in the regencies/cities in the YAPPIKA-ActionAid work area, all of which accommodate the needs of vulnerable groups (such as those due to disability status, religion/spiritual affiliation, and/or gender/sexual identity); and
- 4** Ability to actively promote the active participation of women's groups and women's leadership in the field of work of YAPPIKA-ActionAid to advocate for the provision of basic services. This includes parents of students, community leaders, cadres, school institutions, and health institutions.

YAPPIKA-ActionAid is active in carrying out advocacy agendas at the national level to improve basic education governance. This activity included meeting and coordinating with the Ministry of Education and Culture, Bappenas, KemenPAN-RB, and the Ombudsman of the Republic of Indonesia, to discuss governance for improving basic education infrastructure which would provide more opportunities for self-management at the school level, strengthening the role of school committees, suggestions for the government to draw up a roadmap to solve educational infrastructure problems on a national scale, and for optimizing grievance channels.

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**Program
Priority 2**

Strengthening Civil Society Organization Capacity



The Program Priority 2 of YAPPIKA-ActionAid aims to strengthen the capabilities of CSOs to build independence, active citizenship, and public good.

Expected Target Achievement

In 2028, we expect several targets to be achieved, among which are:

- 1 Increased awareness of CSOs in 50 regencies/cities to improve organizational governance.
- 2 Strengthening the ability of CSOs to influence public policy and serve their constituents in 50 regencies/cities.
- 3 Growing resource organization at the local level, at least in 5 (five) locations.
- 4 Strengthening networks and alliances of supported CSOs, for public advocacy, monitoring, campaigning and knowledge sharing, especially in the education, health and humanitarian sectors at the local, national, regional and international levels.

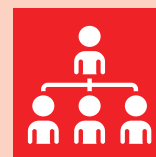

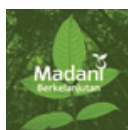

In the first year, a total of 4 (four) organizations have:

- 1** Increased their capacity in 6 (six) main components, namely organizational orientation, governance, organizational management, program management, sustainability, and organizational performance. This activity was carried out using the Organizational Capacity and Performance Analysis Tool (OCPAT) tool, which is a method to improve organizational and team capabilities by assessing organizational performance.
- 2** Been able to identify their main challenges and develop an action plan to increase capacity.
- 3** Successfully prepared 28 Organizational Development Plan (OD Plan) for a period of 2 (two) years and received approval for funding support from The David and Lucile Packard Foundation. Some of them include the preparation of organizational strategic plans for a period of 5 (five) years, preparation and revision of program and financial SOPs, organizational communication strategies, structural changes, and capacity building for organizational staff.
- 4** Conducted kick-off meetings and started to identify the need for consultant support to implement the prepared plans.

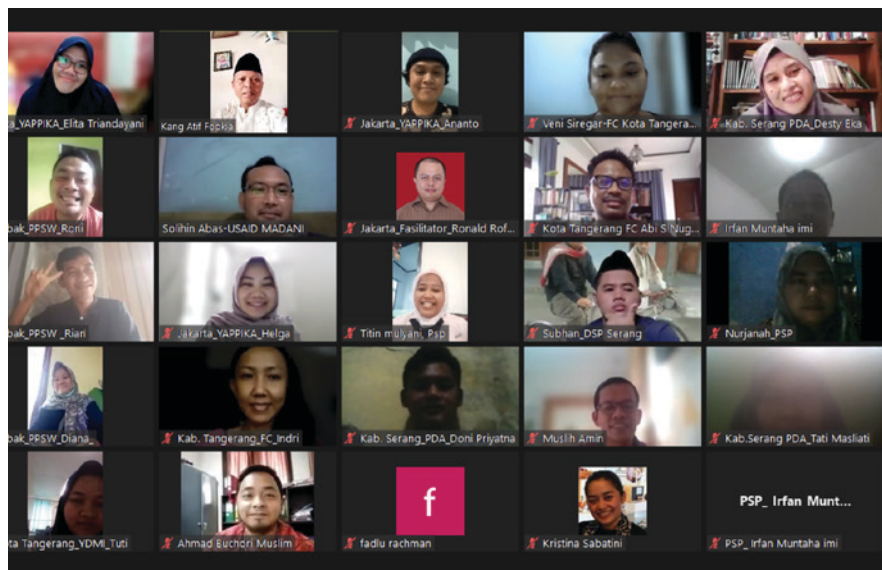
YAPPIKA-ActionAid Technical Assistance in the Civil Society Advocacy Program, Stakeholder Engagement and Community Mobilization

YAPPIKA-ActionAid is one of the partner organizations providing technical assistance services for the USAID/ MADANI Program that collaborates with FHI 360 to strengthen local government accountability and promote community tolerance in Indonesia. From September to December 2021, we have provided

capacity building support to civil organizations in 32 regencies/cities through virtual training and mentoring activities in 3 (three) thematic stages: social accountability, policy advocacy, and community organizing to support the advocacy work.



Thematic Training and Assistance



1

Social Accountability



This training was attended by 230 people, with an almost balanced gender composition, namely 109 women (47%) and 121 men (53%). Based on the results of the pre-test and post-test analysis, as many as 84% of participants experienced improved knowledge of the importance of social accountability and democratic governance, the urgency of opening spaces for public participation in order to improve the quality of public services, and the ability to recognize various social accountability instruments in public service.

Social accountability assistance activities were carried out from October 2021 to March 2022, both virtually and face to face with 32 Lead Partners (LP)/Learning Forum (LF) MADANI partners. A number of social accountability tools are used to assess the quality of public services, including the Community Score Card (CSC), Social Audit, Community Feedback Card, and Citizen Report Card (CRC).

2

Policy Advocacy



This training was attended by 196 people, with an almost balanced gender composition, namely 93 women (46%) and 103 men (54%). Referring to the results of the comparison of pre-test and post-test scores, as many as 64% of participants were able to gain further understanding of evidence-based advocacy, the importance of networking and compiling policy documents in advocacy work, understanding the benefits of mapping stakeholders and strategic actors, knowing public policy quality requirements, as well as issue reframing and creative campaigns.

Policy advocacy assistance activities were carried out from November 2021 to February 2022 virtually for 32 LP/LF MADANI partners. All MADANI Partner LP/LF have written policy documents, and some of them have succeeded in pushing for a number of concrete policy changes, including the District Head's Circular Letter regarding the revitalization of the Youth Posyandu in Sukabumi Regency and the Reduce, Reuse, Recycle (3R) Waste Bank and Waste Management Site (TPS) Management Program together with the Environment Agency to achieve the Zero Waste City program in Gresik Regency.



3

Community Organizing



This training was attended by 168 people, with an almost balanced gender composition, namely 83 women (49%) and 85 men (51%). The results of the participants' pre-test and post-test scores showed that as much as 56% experienced an increase in knowledge regarding how relations/relationships function to identify key partners who can support and hinder community work; organizing cycle; understanding of the stages of social analysis, starting from preparation, field visits, sorting data, determining problems, prioritizing problems and identifying root causes; and understanding of the elements that support community resilience.

Assistance activities on thematic community organizing were carried out virtually from January to February 2022 to 32 MADANI Partner LP/LF by compiling social analysis at the community level. Through this social analysis, the community is able to understand the root causes of the basic issues in public services they face and formulate community-based solutions and strategies to solve these problems.

YAPPIKA-ActionAid Technical Assistance Evaluation Activity

The YAPPIKA-ActionAid Technical Assistance (TA) Evaluation activities were carried out in all USAID/MADANI program location provinces on March 21-24, 2022 and April 4-18, 2022, both virtually and face-to-face. In general, the TA implementation target was achieved. All LP/LF can comprehend evidence-based advocacy processes and strategies as well as community organizing in advocacy work. From the new knowledge acquired, LP/LF actively disseminated knowledge within the

organization's internal environment through discussions.

We identified positive impacts from this activity, including increased collaboration between LP/LF and community members with service providers to carry out CSC recommendations. In addition, because LP/LF presents evidence (evidence-based advocacy) in their advocacy, the legitimacy level of LP/LF increases in the eyes of policy makers.





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Program Priority 3





Civic Space Advocacy

The Program Priority 3 of YAPPIKA-ActionAid aims to fight for a conducive supporting environment for the growth and development of a healthy civil society so that it can carry out its roles.

Expected Target Achievement

In 2028, we expect several targets to be achieved, among which are:

- 1 The formulation and implementation of a legal framework that protects the existence of civil society. The legal framework includes:
 - Freedom of association and assembly.
 - Other civil liberties, such as freedom of expression, freedom of information, and freedom of religion and spiritual affiliation.
 - Fulfillment of the right to public service for minority groups. This will serve as a springboard for advocacy for the recognition of these groups' existence, especially their civil liberties.
- 2 The fostering and strengthening attitudes of tolerance among young people towards Indonesia's diversity.

Encouraging Improvements to the Legal Framework for Public Fundraising in Indonesia

In June 2021, YAPPIKA-ActionAid provided input on the Draft Minister of Social Affairs Regulation concerning Organizing Collection of Money or Goods (Permensos PUB). We view public fundraising as one of the alternative sources of funding for the financial sustainability of CSOs to carry out their roles and missions. In reality, more and more CSOs are raising public funds so that it can encourage Indonesian

people to be more mature in supporting movements and advocacy for humanity, democracy, human rights, anti-corruption, environment and climate change, protection of women and children, legal aid, and so on. Therefore, the government needs to guarantee a conducive supporting environment for the growth of CSOs and philanthropy activities supported by public funds.

Advocacy for the Association Bill: **The Legal Framework for Civil Organization Regulations** **to Strengthen Citizen Political Participation**

In 2021, the Coalition for Freedom of Association has produced an Academic Paper and the civil society version of the Draft Law on Associations (NA and Bill on Associations). The drafting team for the civil society version of NA and the Bill of Associations are YAPPIKA-ActionAid, Pusat Studi Hukum dan Kebijakan (PSHK), Lembaga Studi dan Advokasi Masyarakat (ELSAM), as well as academics from Gadjah Mada University (UGM) and Airlangga University (UNAIR). The material for the Bill regulates a number of aspects,

including general provisions; principle; nature, purpose, and form; rights and obligations of associations with legal entities; establishment; articles of Association; membership; association organs; riches; dissolution of the association; organizational dispute resolution; transitional provisions; and closing terms. We are committed to consistently advocating the Bill so that it can be included in the 2022 or 2023 Priority Prolegnas through the Indonesian Parliament and/or the Ministry of Law and Human Rights.

Working in a Network of Civil Organizations: **A Mandate and a Role that has Never Been Left Behind YAPPIKA-ActionAid**

In addition to managing the Freedom of Association Coalition, we are also involved in the Health Sector Public Service Advocacy Network. In 2021, the Network will carry out advocacy for child-friendly Antiretroviral (ARV) medicines by analyzing the Final Report on the Results of the Indonesian Ombudsman's Inspection on pharmaceutical service issues regarding drug availability for children with HIV/

AIDS. The results of this analysis resulted in 2 (two) documents as further advocacy material: the Legal Opinion Document and the Review of "The Importance of ARVs for Children or ARV Regardless of Importance?". Moreover, YAPPIKA-ActionAid has provided increased capacity for monitoring and public service advocacy to 20 members of Persaudaraan Korban NAPZA Bogor (PKNB).

Arena of Youth Expression for Diversity (ANEKA RAGAM)

Young people are the faces of the past, present and future. Efforts to create a conducive supporting environment for the growth of civil society in Indonesia must be supported by the involvement and active participation of young people. We believe that collective action with young people is the best investment in reflecting the principles of tolerance, diversity and respect for human rights. Through the ANEKA RAGAM's volunteer activities, we open opportunities for young people from various backgrounds, to be involved in the YAPPIKA-ActionAid program and develop their capacity in caring for diversity in Indonesia.

The ANEKA RAGAM was initiated in 2021. Working closely with 5 (five) youth, this initiative was able to become a meeting point to create various campaign product materials on issues

of tolerance, gender equality, disaster mitigation, and civil liberties. The ANEKA RAGAM volunteer team also collaborated with the Tamanjaya Village female youth community to transform their research results into public communication material through graphics and live streaming discussions on Instagram.

In order to reach more youth and increase the involvement of youth, in the same year, YAPPIKA-ActionAid collaborated with SocialConnex, one of the cross-issue youth community ecosystem platforms in Indonesia. The collaboration has linked @kebebasansipil, which is ANEKA RAGAM's social media platform, with more than 300 youth communities on the islands of Sumatra, Java, Kalimantan, Sulawesi and Bali.

Advocacy at the International Level

Advocacy at the international level is one of YAPPIKA-ActionAid ways to enable a conducive environment for CSOs. The two approaches are:



Continuing national level advocacy efforts to expand support and potential for collaboration in the international sphere



Increase engagement in international discourse on civil liberties and human rights

In 2021, YAPPIKA-ActionAid has provided input to the UN Special Rapporteur on the Right to Freedom of Peaceful Assembly and Association for his report at the 47th session of the UN Human Rights Council regarding the important role of public lawyers in the operation of fundamental freedoms. Then, for his report to the 76th session of the UN General Assembly, we raised specific issues regarding the situation of the right to freedom of assembly and association for environmental and climate justice defenders.

In order to continue the voice of civil society at the meeting of the G20 countries in Indonesia in 2022, YAPPIKA-ActionAid joined Civil-20 (C20) with a number of other CSOs. We succeeded in initiating the formation of the C20 Sub-Working Group on Civic Space which focused on formulating a policy paper on the protection of civil space at the meeting.

In addition, YAPPIKA-ActionAid collaborated with the ActionAid Federation, also held a hearing entitled Free Palestine: A People's Hearing. This coincided with the Human Rights Council meeting in Geneva on September 14, 2021 to voice justice for Palestinians. This activity invited representatives of young activists, medical personnel, and the media from Palestine to hear their testimonies regarding human rights crimes that occurred as a result of the conflict, and invited Prof. Makarim Wibisono from Indonesia, as a former UN special rapporteur on the situation in Palestine.

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**Program
Priority 4**

Humanitarian and Resilience

The Program Priority 4 of YAPPIKA-ActionAid aims to build the resilience of communities who are vulnerable to disasters and ensure the safety and security of women, young women and vulnerable groups. With a good level of resilience, society can effectively recover from the effects of natural and human-made disasters. To achieve this goal, the strategic activities carried out are:

- 1 Strengthening the leadership of women and youth in emergency preparedness, response and resilience building.
- 2 Increasing the capacity of stakeholders, namely local governments, community leaders and leaders of faith-based organizations in disaster preparedness and response.
- 3 Developing a 'Community-based Disaster Risk Management' plan.
- 4 Positioning women-led community-based protection programs at the community level.
- 5 Strengthening resilient community livelihoods through knowledge sharing, capacity building and the development of sustainable appropriate technologies.
- 6 Developing community networks of disaster-prone groups so that they can co-advocate on common issues and access resources.
- 7 Conducting research and policy analysis from community-level engagement to influence national disaster management policies.
- 8 Improving emergency preparedness through the institutionalization of emergency funds.

Throughout 2021, we collaborated with local partners on an ongoing basis in post-disaster assisted areas. In November 2021, we carried out an inclusive humanitarian training during a disaster which was attended by 43 participating partners. One of the knowledge products produced by YAPPIKA-ActionAid is a paper with the title strengthening "Community Capacity through Women's Leadership in Disaster Risk Reduction (Case Study: Central Sulawesi and Banten Provinces)" which was presented at the Third Intersectoral Collaboration for Indigenous Religious with the theme: Access to Justice Interrelated Issues and Coalition of Interrelated Sectors.

Expected Target Achievement

In 2028, we expect several targets to be achieved, among which are:

- 1 Communities become more resilient to natural and human-made disasters and are able to effectively navigate the impacts.
- 2 Women-led community-based protection programs are integrated into community structures.
- 3 Community disaster preparedness plans are in place and operational.
- 4 Communities can carry out campaigns and advocacy to mitigate various disaster risks.
- 5 Influence national disaster management policies through research and evidence from community engagement/ participation.

Ile Ape Volcano Eruption Response

On December 1, 2020, Mount Ile Ape, which is located in Lembata Regency, erupted continuously for several months. The emergency response carried out by YAPPIKA-ActionAid on Mount Ile Ape in 2021 was carried out 2 (two) times: on January 23-28, 2021 and on April 26-May 7, 2021. On February 24, 2021, the Geological Agency of the Ministry of Energy and Mineral Resources observed that volcanic eruptions were still ongoing and were followed by earthquakes. In April 2021, 7 (seven) villages around Mount Ile Ape were affected by cold lava floods at the start of the rainy season and 3 (three) villages were still isolated. Therefore, YAPPIKA-ActionAid provided support by distributing emergency aid to survivors of the Mount Ile Ape eruption, namely 491 packages for 14 villages in January 2021 and 200 food packages for 6 (six) villages in April-May 2021.

Response to the 2021 Mamuju Earthquake Disaster

In January 2021, an earthquake of 5.8M occurred in Mamuju, West Sulawesi. YAPPIKA-ActionAid and YASMIB carried out a rapid study in Sese, Tadui, Batu Panu, Pulau, Tamasapi, Taan, Karampuang, Mamunyu, Binanga, Karema, and Rimuku Villages. The study involved village chiefs, community leaders, and women's groups. The expansive community participation was aimed to discuss matters around the number and data of beneficiaries, as well as the mechanism for distributing aid. The representatives were tasked with providing support to the YASMIB volunteer team in identifying beneficiaries. Representatives of female cadres became the liaising coordinators between evacuation posts and implementation of referral mechanisms for handling gender-based violence against women and children.

The emergency response program focuses on 5 (five) main activities, namely:



Distribution of **897 aid** packages and Protection Aid pamphlets to **772 affected families** and **215 women** from vulnerable groups



Distribution of **897 COVID-19** response packages and pamphlets for preventing the spread of COVID-19 to **772 affected families** and **215** vulnerable women



Distribution of staple food packages for families to **772 families**



Distribution of staple food packages for **290 babies and toddlers**, which were distributed 2 times to the same beneficiaries



Setting up a referral mechanism for GBV cases and psychosocial support for GBV survivors

In addition to the distribution of aid, YAPPIKA-ActionAid and YASMIB also succeeded in organizing 19 women to become cadres for the protection of women and children and advocating to encourage referral channels for the protection of women and children from villages-regencies-provinces. This referral channel was officially launched on March 7, 2021 and was attended by the Regent of Mamuju and the Chairperson of the West Sulawesi Provincial Family Welfare Empowerment (PKK).



Response to the COVID-19 Pandemic

Throughout 2021, we carried out inclusive vaccination activities in 19 regencies/cities with 12 local partners and managed to reach 60,142 doses. Collaborating with local partners who are experienced in inclusive vaccination enabled us to target priority vulnerable groups such as the elderly, people with disabilities, informal women workers, transgender, high-risk groups such as people with HIV/AIDS, sex workers, people with disabilities, communities in brothel area, and people with mental health issues. The government's response to this acceleration of inclusive vaccination was expressed through the direct appreciation from regional leaders.

New approaches and innovations in the response to the COVID-19 pandemic are being implemented using a local approach called *jimpitan* (public fundraising model). Additional transportation services were provided for the elderly.

Seroja Cyclone Disaster Response

We worked with Bengkel APPeK as a local partner to distribute aid packages for disaster survivors to communities in Kupang and Lembata Regencies, from May to June 2021. The distribution of 1,273 aid packages reached 464 Heads of Families (KK) in Kupang and Lembata Regencies consisting of:

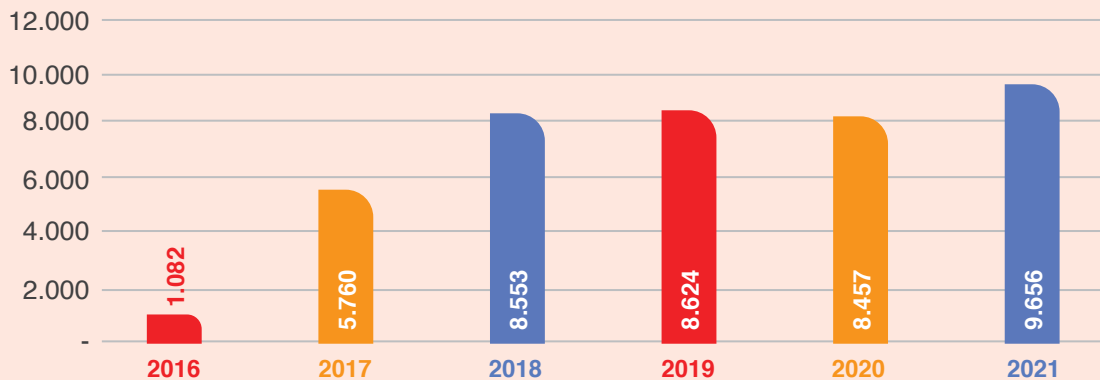
Girl-Led Research

Collaborated with ActionAid Bangladesh, ActionAid Ethiopia, and ActionAid UK, we are conducting research led by young girls in 2021. This activity researched the life experience of young girls aged 12 to 21 years in 3 (three) countries: Indonesia, Bangladesh, and Ethiopia. The five aspects of this research are health and welfare, economic rights, freedom from violence, education and life skills, and girls in decision-making and critical response. The research took place in Tamanjaya Village, Pandeglang, Banten a rural community previously affected by the tsunami in Indonesia. The number of women who have at least completed education up to junior high school or equivalent is 46.8%, lower than men, which is 55.1%. In this research, young girls raised research topics on freedom from violence and health, welfare, education, and life skills.
